15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The University wholeheartedly embraces the vision outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) with CBCS, aimed at providing high-quality education for holistic development of students. Faculty members engaged in discussions to understand and implement key principles of the NEP, such as diversification of curricula and pedagogy, integration of technological innovations, and fostering critical thinking, creativity and logical decision-making skills.

Since the academic year 2021-2022, the University has effectively implemented the NEP-2020, aligning with NEP Regulations, 2021.

Institutional NEP policies were proposed, approved and integrated into the Statutory Academic Council and the Governing Body of State Government. Academic programs have been revamped to include Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary courses as electives, providing students with enhanced flexibility in their course selection. Additionally, students have the opportunity to choose open elective courses from other departments, promoting crossdisciplinary learning and holistic development.

The curriculum structure now includes various components such as Discipline Specific Core Courses, Electives, Ability Enhancement Courses, Skill Enhancement Courses, Value-Based Courses, Yoga, Health & Wellness, Sports and Physical Fitness. Through these proactive measures, the university demonstrates its commitment to implementing the recommendations outlined in the NEP, thereby enriching the educational experience and nurturing well-rounded individuals equipped for success in a rapidly evolving global landscape.

NEP also focuses on human values, ethics and service to the society. It has introduced various subjects such as India and Indian Constitution, Environmental Science, Gender Equity, Financial Awareness, Digital Fluency, Artificial Intelligence, Cyber Security as skill enhancement courses(SEC) at degree level for the students of all discipline.

Extension activities, coordinated by various units such as NSS, NCC, Scouts, YRC, Red Ribbon club, and other cells of the college, play a pivotal role in raising students' awareness about their health, community and environmental values. These extension activities impart sense of social responsibility among students.

Collaborative endeavors undertaken within the institution provide students with opportunities to broaden their perspectives and adapt to different learning environments. By participating in such activities, students develop crucial skills such as teamwork, leadership, and adaptability, preparing them to excel in diverse academic and professional settings. Through these initiatives, the institution aims to cultivate well-rounded individuals who are not only academically proficient but also socially conscious and equipped to make meaningful contributions to their society and the nation at large.

The institution is privileged and deeply committed to integrating these productive changes for holistic educational development that nurtures the overall growth of students' academic potentials by exposing them to diverse disciplines and a plethora of ideas for development and exploration.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) is a virtual repository that stores information on the credits earned by individual students throughout their academic journey. The institution acknowledges the importance of registering for the NEP proposed ABC to foster a learner-centric approach, promote interdisciplinary and provide students with opportunities to enroll in courses of their choice and pursue them at their own pace.

The college embraces a flexible learning approach through a choice-based education system, supported by robust technological and infrastructural facilities conducive to implementing the ABC system effectively. With the ABC system, students gain the flexibility to transfer credits and enter/exit educational institutions based on their accumulated credits. The college has invested significant efforts in aligning with the objectives of the ABC system, emphasizing student-centric and learner-friendly approaches in its curriculum design.

Currently, NSS, NCC, sports, Scouts, Guides and YRCstudents can acquire additional credits through extracurricular pursuits such as participation in annual camps, blood donation camps and extension activities organized at University, district, state and national level. This provision expands the holistic educational opportunities available to individuals, reinforcing the institution's commitment to providing a comprehensive and enriching learning environment.

17.Skill development:

Each department offers certificate courses tailored to boost employability and skill development through Value Added Courses. The NEP Curriculum has provided student opportunity to enhance their skills in their degree programme such as Digital fluency, Artificial Intelligence, India & Indian Constitution, Environmental Studies, Financial Education & Awareness, and Cyber Security as a Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC).

The Institute seeks collaborative &Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for skill development initiatives. Students are provided training programs through Placement Cell, Career Counseling Cell and English Lab. In addition expertial learning methods Such as Internship / Industrial Visit / Field Visit & Academic Projects

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help the Students in skill development.

Special days are observed to impart societal values. The college, through BLDE Association's MoU with Deshpande Educational Trust and the National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), aims to provide employability skills to graduate from rural and semi-urban regions. Training includes employability and interview skills. Several numbers of students are selected in the placement drive organized in the college. These initiatives underscore the college's commitment to holistic education and equipping students with practical skills essential for their professional success and societal contribution.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college has Bhasha Vignana Vedike as a platform for Students to learn about Indian languages & culture. The students also have an opportunity to learn Indian languages such as Kannada, Hindi, Marathi & Sanskrit. In addition cultural events, food festivals & celebration of Jayantees contribute to promote unity & diversity and thus create awareness among the students about the cultural heritage of India. The college has Women Empowerment Cell & ICC through which various activities & programs are organized to create awareness about gender equity, Indian culture, Indian value & entrepreneurship.

The college has MoU's with corporate companies which facilitate the students & faculties for online Courses. Thus the college is committed to enable the students to appreciate the Indian culture & values and be instrumental in-creating culturally & ethically a strong society.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is a student-centric approach to education that emphasizes clearly defined learning outcomes. It focuses on what students are expected to know and be able to do, leading to improved competency in knowledge acquisition and cognitive skills. OBE encourages students not only to memorize facts but also to analyze and interpret complex information, thereby identifying their strengths and weaknesses.

Before each program begins, students are briefed on Program Outcomes (PO), Program Specific Outcomes (PSO), and Course Outcomes (CO).

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All undergraduate and postgraduate programs at the institution are aligned with Outcome-Based Education, taking into account local, regional, and global requirements. Each program has clearly stated POs, PSOs, and COs, designed in accordance with Bloom's Taxonomy. The adoption of OBE ensures that the curriculum meets both educational and employment sector needs, producing skilled professionals.

The college's IQAC ensures faculty and students are well-informed about OBE through regular Faculty Development Programs (FDPs) and awareness sessions. This shift from teacher-centered to student-centered learning empowers students to make informed choices based on their aptitudes and desired outcomes. The institution also updates its official website with details of expected outcomes for each course program, enhancing awareness of this adopted learning approach.

Overall, OBE serves as a pedagogical model that enhances the quality of the curriculum and prepares students for success in both academic and professional spheres. The institution's commitment to implementing and promoting OBE reflects its dedication to providing a learner-centric educational experience.

20.Distance education/online education:

The institution prioritizes flexibility in learning and exploration, facilitated through ICT-enabled teaching infrastructure such as Wi-Fi enabled departments, smart classrooms, and well-equipped computer labs. Faculty members underwent intensive training to adapt to the evolving educational landscape, encouraging student engagement in virtual classrooms. Utilizing technologies like LCD, smart classrooms, and language labs.

During induction programs, students receive training on accessing and utilizing resources for academic growth, promoting the adoption of blended learning on campus. The college has taken steps to bridge the digital divide by providing deserving students with necessary technological support.

Amid the pandemic, most classes shifted online, with faculty adapting instructional approaches accordingly. ICT tools such as LMS MOODLE, OBS, and Google Classroom facilitated effective teaching and learning. The college library offers a wealth of online e-resources to support students' academic needs.

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Assessments are conducted online using platforms like Quizzes and Google Forms, while faculty members participate in training programs to enhance their digital skills for managing online education. Opportunities for interaction with experts in various fields are provided through online seminars and classes organized by the institution.

Overall, the institution's proactive approach to leveraging ICT tools and online platforms has enabled seamless transition to online learning, ensuring continuity of education and providing enriching opportunities for both faculty and students to enhance their skills and knowledge.

The Time Table Committee andthe PG Coordinators prepares a common time table for UG courses under the guidance of the Principal and the IQAC coordinator. They encourage active participation through Group Discussions, Quizzes, Skits, and Debate Competitions.

Interactive Learning: The campus is equipped with Wi-Fi connectivity, smart boards, and ICT-enabled classrooms to foster interactive learning environments. Special lectures, seminars, conferences, and workshops further enhance this interactive learning experience.

Experiential Learning: The institution offers a range of programs such as Projects, Case Studies, Industrial Visits, Field Visits, Research Institution visits, and IT Visits. These initiatives, along with opportunities in sports, yoga, communication skills,

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and extracurricular activities like NSS, NCC, YRC, and Scouts & Guides, provide students with both physical and emotional strength. Student's participation in these programmes provide hands-on experience and learning experience.

The rules and regulations for evaluation process are laid down by the affiliating University and are communicated to the students through notices and in the orientation sessions organized by UG and PG programmes.

As per the Parent University guidelines two Internal Assessment Tests are conducted in the 8th week and 12th week of every semester. The Examination Committee of the college prepares centralize time-table for the UG Arts and Science programmes. The students are informed about the syllabus and the time-table well in advance. The self-financed courses BCA, MA, English, M.Sc.(CS), M.Sc. (chemistry) and M.Sc.(Physics) individually hold the two internal IA tests as per the Parent University guidelines.

The Answer-Scripts are evaluated by the faculty and the markslists are displayed on the notice board of the respective departments. The student's signature is taken on the IA markslist. Grievances if any are addressed and are recorded in a register maintained by the respective departments. The final IA marks are entered in the UUCMS portal. The projects of UG and PG programmes are guided by the faculty of the respective departments.

The students' grievance with regard to IA is resolved before the final submission of IA marks at the UUCMS portal and sameare recorded in a register and maintained by the respective departments.

The UG Arts and Science disciplines provide institute-labeled answer sheets for IA tests and the self-financed courses provide department Blue-Books.

The Projects of BCA and all PG programmes are guided by the faculty of the respective departments. Later the External Examiners deputed by the University conduct the project viva-voce. Marks are submitted through UUCMS portal.

The students of all UG and PG programmes are given assignments with specified submission date. Class seminars are a regular feature for all the programmes. Field visits, Projects and Group discussions are conducted by a few departments.

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University examinations. After the commencement of the semester, bridge course facilitates a smooth transition for students. Remedial classes support slow learners until they upgrade their learning levels.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college provides comprehensive facilities to cater to the academic needs of its 1898 students across 3 U.G., 4 P.G., and 1 Ph.D. programs. The campus has girls hostel with the accommodation for more than 200 students.

The Time-Table Committee annually prepares a schedule to optimize resource utilization. There are 26 classrooms, including 7 equipped with LAN-connected projectors, Wi-Fi-enabled campus (speed: 13 mbps), 10 projectors serve 7 classrooms with ICT facilities. Three seminar halls, equipped with ICT infrastructure, host guest lectures, seminars, meetings, and conferences. The college has 21 well-equipped laboratories for UG and PG science departments. Additionally, 4 smart boards are distributed across departments like B.C.A., Statistics, B.Sc. (CS), and Zoology. In addition, the language lab, with 20 computers and Wordsworth software, supports in developing the communication skills among the students.

4.1.2 - The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

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The college offers extensive facilities to support extracurricular activities encompassing culture, creativity, arts, and recreation, along with provisions for cultural, sports, and yoga activities.

The college has a vast playground spanning 30,402 square meters, including a 400-meter track with 8 lanes. Facilities include grounds for cricket, football, hockey, and courts for volleyball, lawn tennis, tennikoit, and kho-kho. Additionally, there's a multipurpose sports hall and an indoor stadium accommodating up to 1000 spectators. An international standard swimming pool, 50x20 meters, equipped with a dedicated trainer, is accessible to students.

Yoga activities take place in the open auditorium, while a well-equipped gymnasium, sized 40x30 square feet, caters to fitness enthusiasts.

The Seminar Hall with 200 seating capacity provides necessary platform for literally and Cultural events.

The college library is a resource of knowledge, housing rare books alongside a vast collection of reference materials. With 52,814 book titles, 69,760 books, 14 newspapers (in Kannada and English), 26 magazines, 23 journals, 184 bound volumes, and 640 CD/DVDs, students have access to a plethora of resources.

Featuring an internet browsing center with seating for 20 students, the library offers access to a WEB OPAC search engine, enabling online public access to its catalog. Through N-LIST eresources, students can freely access a wealth of digital materials, including open access journals, e-journals, and INFLIBNET resources. Additionally, the library provides access to select journals from publishers like Elsevier and ACS through sister institutions.

The college also participates in organizations like IRINS and Vidwan. The UG & PG faculty members, research scholars utilize Turnitin plagiarism software for student's projects with thresholds set at 25% and 10% plagiarism respectively. Moreover, a barcode version of the moment register facilitates faculty and student check-ins and check-outs, aiding in usage statistics tracking.

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purification system. Rainwater harvesting is employed for groundwater recharge. E-waste is responsibly disposed to recycling vendors, with reusable components salvaged to fund physical infrastructure development. Biomedical waste, including biological samples, is autoclaved are disposed of safely. Recycling initiatives include repurposing test booklet sheets and using dried bamboo as hanging planters, showcasing sustainable practices embraced by the Botany Department.
